# From the Pastor

#### Matthew 26

<sup>36</sup> Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." <sup>37</sup> He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be grieved and agitated. <sup>38</sup> Then he said to them, "I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me." <sup>39</sup> And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want." <sup>40</sup> Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? <sup>41</sup> Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; <sup>[4]</sup> the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." <sup>42</sup> Again he went away for the second time and prayed, "My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done." <sup>43</sup> Again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. <sup>44</sup> So leaving them again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words.

It will not be a surprise to anyone that I am part of a number of online communities that discuss Christianity and religion in general. Someone in one of those communities recently shared a question: Did Jesus have a panic attack in the garden of Gethsemane? My response was that we can't know, as we don't have enough evidence (and no one was around who could have diagnosed a panic attack), but I thought that the answer would say a lot about what a person thinks of anxiety disorders.

The church, generally speaking, has a poor track record in dealing with mental illness. Not that our society has a better one, historically, but at least outside the church one can seek therapeutic help, be prescribed medication, etc. that could help. Within the church, seeking help is more risky. There are many - many pastors, many parishioners, even a number of church celebrities and public figures, who equate mental illness with weakness or even sin. The idea that if you pray hard enough, or pray the right way, that you will be freed of any mental illness is a common one.

After all, we have stories of Jesus driving out demons, and many people conflate demonpossession with mental illness. (This is a complex issue for another time, but I'd say the two are not the same) Surely Jesus is able to drive out something less dramatic like an anxiety disorder or depression, or schizoaffective disorder, or borderline personality disorder. And if someone is suffering in these ways, might it not be because they don't have enough faith?

I've lost count of the conversations like these I've had with Christians. It was especially common to hear this kind of thing as a kid and an adolescent, because I wasn't yet able to really choose where I'd go to church. When I was able to do so, I avoided communities where I heard that message...I was going to say I 'avoided them like the plague', but we've learned that a lot of people don't avoid plagues. So maybe, I avoided them like a noxious smell.

Because they are invisible - cannot be detected with a blood test or an x-ray or a CT scan - mental illnesses often have a different status compared to other kinds of illness. It's rare for someone to be told that they have hypertension because they lack faith, or that they need to pray their sciatica away. It's understood that people suffering from those things should seek medical help, and maybe make changes to their lives to become healthier. Even more severe physical illnesses are treated as just that: illnesses.

I'm thankful for the work that's being done to reduce the stigma around mental health struggles, especially from within the church. I feel like I do a small amount of that when I talk about my own struggles (with anxiety and depression, namely). Others do so, like Dwight L. Carson years ago, or like Sarah Griffith Lund more recently. The PCUSA is sponsoring and encouraging a lot of these kinds of conversations through a Mental Health Ministry Grant Program and the Presbyterian Mental Health Network. I'm glad to think that someone now will have a very different experience compared to what I had as an adolescent and young adult struggling with these issues.

To return to Jesus: I would say that there's nothing about the idea that Jesus might have had a panic attack, or even a panic disorder (causing him to regularly isolate himself and avoid crowds for periods of time, for example), that detracts from him being Jesus, the Lord, the Savior, the Messiah. If that troubles you - if it is hard to imagine Jesus struggling with mental health - then I think that says a lot about one's view of mental health. I hope that we as a worshiping community can be open to conversations about mental health, and that we can be accommodating and welcoming to people who have all kinds of challenges in their lives.

### Focus: St. Mary's Franciscan Shelter

Our church has many important relationships with local ministries that serve poor and marginalized members of our community. One organization with which have current and long-term connections is St. Mary's Franciscan Shelter, located on Emmett Street in Phoenixville. Founded in 1987, St. Mary's Shelter has – to date – provided over 173,000 nights of shelter and over 519,000 meals for between 700 and 800 families. St. Mary's is one of the few shelters in the area that allows parents to stay with their children. It is obviously a great benefit when families can remain together during difficult times. The staff at St. Mary's is committed to fostering the dignity of each individual and to seeking innovative ways to help families move toward independence. Recently, transitional apartments were established at St. Mary's and the first two families have now taken up residence. St. Mary's holistic concern for residents is further demonstrated by a lovely garden established as a quiet space for families and by visiting volunteers who provide recreation, organize play groups, and direct creative activities. At First Presbyterian Church, we are blessed to have the opportunity to partner with St. Mary's Franciscan Shelter in helping homeless families find stability, independence, and a place to call home.

You may drop off your cartridges in the church office or through the mail slot on the office door. This program helps you recycle your cartridges, while at the same time assisting the church.


Also regarding our church school program, please note the following:

# Foodology

Did someone say chocolate? This recipe is sure to melt the heart of your Valentine!

# **Chocolate Strawberry Jelly Roll**

### **INGREDIENTS**

One 15.25-ounce box white cake mix (plus required ingredients)

1 stick (8 tablespoons) unsalted butter, at room temperature

4 ounces cream cheese, at room temperature

2 cups confectioners' sugar

One 1.2-ounce bag freeze-dried strawberries, plus more for decorating

2 pounds dark chocolate, chopped

2 tablespoons refined coconut oil or vegetable shortening

### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Coat a 9-by-13-inch baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. Prepare the cake mix as directed; pour the batter into the prepared pan. Bake until a cake tester inserted in the center of the cake comes out clean, about 30 minutes. Let cool completely.

Meanwhile, combine the butter and cream cheese in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment (or in a large bowl if using a handheld electric mixer). Mix on medium-high speed until combined and fluffy, about 2 minutes. Reduce the speed to low and gradually add in the confectioners' sugar. Increase the speed to medium-high and beat until fluffy and combined, about 2 minutes.

Crumble the cake into a large bowl. Add 1/4 cup of the frosting and mix with your hands until smooth and combined. Line a 15 1/2-by-10 1/2-inch jelly roll pan with plastic wrap. Put the cake "dough" on top. Cover with another sheet of plastic wrap and pat the mixture into an even rectangle that fills the pan.

Transfer the mixture in the plastic to a work surface (the shorter side facing you) and roll out just enough so that the surface is smooth. This helps make the dough even and not patchy. Press the flat side of a ruler against all the sides of the dough so they are straight. The dough should be about 10-by-15 inches.

Put the freeze-dried strawberries in a spice grinder and pulse until finely ground. Add to the bowl with the remaining frosting and beat until combined. Remove the top sheet of plastic wrap from the dough. Add the strawberry frosting and spread out evenly with a small offset spatula, leaving about a 1-1/2" border on the short side furthest away from you.

Roll the dough away from you into a jelly roll shape, using the plastic to roll tightly until it's covered by the plastic. Place it on a baking sheet. Freeze while you make the chocolate coating.

Combine the dark chocolate and coconut oil in a heatproof bowl set over a pan of simmering water. Stir until melted and smooth, about 6 minutes. Remove the bowl from the saucepan and set aside until cooled and thickened slightly, about 7 minutes. Meanwhile, unwrap the jelly roll cake and place on a rack set over a baking sheet. Pour the chocolate over the cake until completely covered. Decorate the top with freeze-dried strawberries. Freeze until the chocolate is set, about 5 minutes. Transfer to a serving platter and cut into slices. Serve chilled.
