From the Pastor

Matthew 5

- 5 When Jesus^[a] saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. ² And he began to speak and taught them, saying:
- ³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- 4 "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
- ⁵ "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
- 6 "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
- 7 "Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.
- ⁸ "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
- ⁹ "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

You may have heard the term "Christian Nationalism" more often recently, as well as similar terms like "White Nationalism" and "Christofascism," though I say "might" because of how siloed and separate our news sources and connections are. It might seem to be that a term or idea or story is everywhere, and you might not have heard of it at all. But "Christian Nationalism" is something that some politicians have been saying about themselves, and has also been a criticism and a warning about a growing movement in our society. Christian Nationalism has been linked to mass shootings and acts of terrorism, both recently and in our history, and in world history it has been an explicit part of Fascist movements in places like Italy and Germany. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, for example, rejected the Christian Nationalism of Germany and helped organize an 'underground seminary' which was condemned by the political and religious authorities of the Third Reich who were, among other things, Christian Nationalists.

A pithy definition of Christian Nationalism can be a challenge, but here is one: *Christian Nationalism is the belief that a particular kind of Christianity should be forced upon a society through legislation and ultimately law enforcement.* It combines Nationalism, the belief that one's nation is superior to all others, with a perversion of Christianity that espouses repression and bigotry. It is a version of Christianity that rejects scripture and the example of Christ in particular, and replaces it with a national myth of past purity and greatness that must be regained. Christian Nationalism demands that people be marginalized, driven out, or harmed if they don't fit the narrow view of Christianity being imposed. It is similar to Theocracy, where religious and political authority are held by the same group, and if successful, could easily become Theocracy.

When Christian Nationalism was on the rise in Germany (it was then called the German Christian movement), some in the Roman Catholic Church and some Synods of the Evangelical Lutheran Church and Reformed Churches sided with the Nazi party. Outwardly this was for the sake of the unity and strength of the German nation. In the midst of rising inflation and perceived national embarrassment and loss of honor, Christian Nationalists came together for a return to former greatness (sound familiar?). This greatness was served by targeting marginalized people, including LGBTQ persons and the disabled, as well as socialists and pacifists, and of course Jewish communities who were religious minorities.

In our Presbyterian Constitution, Book 1 is the Book of Confessions, and one of those Confessions is the Theological Declaration of Barmen. I encourage you to read it (it is available <u>free online as a pdf</u> through the PCUSA website) but in brief, the Barmen Declaration is a theological declaration against Christian Nationalism. In Article 5 specifically, it makes it clear that the church can never become an arm of the state, and that the state can never become an arm of the church. Even though the tradition around separation of church and state is different in Europe, this statement meant that for the Confessing Churches of Germany at the time, Christian Nationalism would never be a

faithful option. Christian Nationalism in the United States now is different, of course, from Christian Nationalism in Germany in the 1930s. It is similar, however, in that it is heretical, and an abandonment of what I see as genuine Christianity, and a move in the direction of marginalization and violence.

I referenced the Beatitudes at the beginning of this perspective because I wanted a pithy reminder of what the kin-dom of God actually looks like. Reading the New Testament itself is probably an excellent cure for Christian Nationalist leanings. (As with Fundamentalists, I think that Christian Nationalists can hold their position specifically because they do not know scripture very well) What's clear is that the kin-dom of God does not look like Christian Nationalism, whether the German or the American variety. It looks like belonging to the poor in spirit, and comforting those who mourn, and inheritance that is won through humility, and hunger for doing what's right, and showing mercy, and purity of heart, and being peacemakers. Where we see these things, we can say that we see followers of Jesus, and we do not see these things in Christian Nationalism.




Meals for St. Mary's Franciscan Shelter



Session Meeting Information:


- Motions from the May 24, 2022 Stated Session Meeting:
