From the Pastor

Isaiah 40

- 3 A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God.
- 4 Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low;

the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain.

5 Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

6 A voice says, "Cry out!"

And I said, "What shall I cry?"

All flesh is grass; their constancy is like the flower of the field.

7 The grass withers; the flower fades,

[[when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass.

8 The grass withers; the flower fades,]] but the word of our God will stand forever.

I quoted that last bit, "The grass withers; the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever" this past week. It is what we used to say at the end of the readings during worship - it's the kind of thing we say in worship with huge implications that maybe we don't have time to consider, in the moment.

I like the context of the preceding verses of Isaiah 40, because we are reminded that this is also a text we read in the Lectionary, often during Advent. Prepare ye the way. The voice cries out in the wilderness (which is the way my grandfather described serving as an Elder in his church, I suddenly remember) - the voice cries out to make the path straight for the Lord, and then immediately after, cries out that all flesh is grass.

We think of the breath of God as life-giving, and it is. The words for spirit in Hebrew and Greek mean breath, and the breath of God is what transformed inert clay into the first living people in the creation story of Genesis. We have hymns, like "Breathe on Me, Breath of God."

In this passage from Isaiah, there is more. The breath of God brings life as well as death - in the text, the grass withers and the flowers fade when the breath of the Lord blows upon them. In the context of the ancient world, people were able to see both good and ill coming from God. For them, God was the source of all things, good and bad, life and death. The grass and flowers grew at God's will, and withered by the same will.

Now, in 2022, we understand some things differently. We have better explanations for why many things happen - meteorology, ecology, social sciences and so on. This doesn't mean that God does less, just that we have a better understanding of the world around us, and of ourselves. More knowledge, if not more wisdom.

But God can still be the god who withers the grass and the flowers. God can act to remind us of our mortality, our limited nature. We have an excellent reminder of that limited nature towering in our sanctuary - we call it "Stairway to Heaven." There is a huge scaffold holding up our ceiling and to some degree, possibly our whole roof as well. When it rains, some water is trickling into the sanctuary, and we are catching it in a bucket. This is not at all what we want to be happening - it is frightening to think about something falling apart around us, even if it is not to a point where it cannot be repaired.

The grass withers and the flower fades, but the word of God will stand forever. In being reminded of what does not last, what cannot last, we are also reminded of that which endures. Grass and flowers do not last forever; buildings do not last forever; bodies do not last forever. But when we shape our lives to reflect the life of Christ, when we participate in building up in the kingdom of God, we are part of something eternal.

Perhaps God puts cracks in our ceiling to remind us of that.
















Seems we jumped the gun on the Bocce announcement...but look for Bocce & hot dogs in the spring of 2023.
