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## From the Pastor

#### Luke 14:28-33

<sup>28</sup> For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it? <sup>29</sup> Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him, <sup>30</sup> saying, 'This fellow began to build and was not able to finish.' <sup>31</sup> Or what king, going out to wage war against another king, will not sit down first and consider whether he is able with ten thousand to oppose the one who comes against him with twenty thousand? <sup>32</sup> If he cannot, then while the other is still far away, he sends a delegation and asks for the terms of peace. <sup>33</sup> So therefore, none of you can become my disciple if you do not give up all your possessions.

Jesus said some frightening things. When we, in the comparably affluent 21st century, living in the wealthiest nation ever to exist, read the above passage, our scramble begins. Many of us feel we are Jesus's disciples, and none of us have given up all of our possessions (to my knowledge), so what do we do with this text, and others like it? Because Jesus is not shy about talking about the cost of following him, nor is he hesitant to name wealth as a barrier between us and him; camels going through the eye of the needle and so on. And of course, for those of us who are broke, or have been broken and might be again, it sounds even less fair. I and many people my age and younger have a negative 'net worth', i.e. more debts than we have assets. So what exactly are we going to give away?

Some of this can be worked through with the difference in context between an Iron Age agrarian occupied territory then, and a late capitalist information economy today. The comparison is not 1:1. At the same time, that sounds like yet another excuse to hold on to what we have. I can imagine what Jesus might say.

Historically, this was why Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox clergy were not allowed to own property, get married, or have children - so that they would have no motivation to accumulate property because they had no one else to support and no one to inherit it. At the same time, the Roman Catholic Church in Europe owned literally a third of all of the land on the continent and was far wealthier than any individual nation for hundreds of years. That is how they got around texts like this. Individual clergy owned nothing, but the church that supported them had far more wealth than kings and emperors. A bishop who took a vow of poverty and 'owned nothing' could easily live in a palace willed with servants and defended by soldiers, receiving taxes from lands he controlled. On behalf of the Church, of course.

What brought this to mind this week wasn't reflecting on wealth, but rather, conversations about racial justice that took place at the last Presbytery meeting in mid-November. The Presbytery meeting was hosted by the Racial Justice Task Force, formed a few years ago in Donegal Presbytery to study and make recommendations around racial issues. They led worship, and during a pause in worship we spent time in small groups discussing racism, its impacts, and our response as disciples of Jesus.

One thing that becomes clear in these conversations, in the church and elsewhere, is that we are all at different places mentally and emotionally with regard to racial justice. Almost everyone agrees that racial justice is important, and that racism is wrong. Those who believe otherwise don't say so aloud, except in very particular company. For some, they thought we could address racism by focusing on people of color who are flourishing and doing well instead of focusing on the problems that they face. Others talked about the work they had done and were doing around racial reconciliation, and even in those cases, there is always the nagging sense that it is not enough.

Our own group's discussion took a turn that reminded me of the passage above. We talked about the distance between what we were theoretically able to do compared to what we were willing to do.

One pastor put it this way: "Of course people are in favor of racial justice - as long as it doesn't cost them anything, and as long as it doesn't affect their children's or grandchildren's lives, or chances at getting a job, and as long as it doesn't affect their paycheck or their retirement. As long as they can still do whatever they want to do, sure they're in favor of it. But the moment it costs them something, well..."

When most of us say we care about an issue, what we are describing is a feeling that we have - a feeling of empathy or sympathy, anger or pity. The problem is that these feelings come relatively easily, and they fade just as easily. Our feelings might not have anything to do with our behaviors. We might care deeply about an issue, and talk about it without friends and family, and watch documentaries about it, but not donate a single dollar, or volunteer a single hour, to do anything about it.

To be fair, we are presented with far too much to care about - to be angry about, or sad about, or scared about, or more rarely, happy about. Media companies leverage those emotions to keep our attention so they can sell advertising - they definitely don't care the slightest bit about whether we act to make any of the situations we care about better. And even if the deluge of issues to care about was well-meaning and well-intentioned, it still quickly exceeds our ability to do anything about any of it.

So perhaps the key question is not what we care about, but what we are willing to sacrifice for. There is a cost to doing good - are we willing to pay it? Having counted the cost, what is worth it to us - worth our time, our money, our energy and effort?

Over the last few years in particular, I have found it helpful to focus my feelings, as much as I can, on things where I can have an impact. In the back of my mind is the question: what will I do about this? If the answer is that I'm unwilling or unable to do something, then I try to let that concern go as much as I can. It is a way of keeping myself honest, with myself and others. It's also encouraging, because I end up meeting other people who are taking action, and we are able to encourage one another, because it can be hard to carry on where there is so much in the world going wrong.

I'm not able, or not willing, to give everything, but I take some comfort in being able to say what I have done, little as it is, to build up the kin-dom of God here and now. It certainly isn't all that I'm called to do, but it helps me avoid the paralysis of caring about everything at once.
