From the Pastor

1 Corinthians 7:7-9

7 I wish that all were as I myself am. But each has a particular gift from God, one having one kind and another a different kind. ⁸ To the unmarried and the widows I say that it is good for them to remain unmarried as I am. ⁹ But if they are not practicing self-control, they should marry. For it is better to marry than to be aflame with passion.

I'm trying to stay on Sue's good side (a very important aspect of my ministry), and so I am starting work on this Perspective article on February 15th, otherwise known as Friends Day. It comes in the candy-strewn aftermath of Valentine's Day, during which, as we learned last night at trivia, billions of cards and flowers and candies are exchanged each year. It is a lot of time and attention each year celebrating a particular relationship that is not universal. Not only are there many who are not part of a couple now, but there are many who never will be, or who often are not. I quoted the passage from Paul in 1 Corinthians above to remind us that Paul's preference was for everyone to

be chaste and single. His allowance for marriage was for those who couldn't practice self-control, though he wished that all could be as he was: single and presumably content.

We forget, too, that as far as we know Jesus never married. Dan Brown notwithstanding, the idea that no gospel would mention Jesus' marriage if he was in fact married is hard to believe. As a Rabbi in his 30s, it would have been expected that he would be married, and no one would have thought much of it. I imagine many of the people who heard him speak or saw him heal or exorcise assumed that he had a wife at home and possibly children. But as far as we know, he went against his own culture and never married, similar to Paul, and to others in the early church and since.

In the church, we often put a premium on married couples, and in almost all churches, this means married heterosexual couples (with children) specifically. We love seeing so many children on Sundays, and welcoming more children and more young families is a sign of health. But welcoming more widows and widowers, and more adults who never married, and more young people who are dating, would also be signs of health. Despite ourselves, we easily buy into the idea that the church is supposed to look a certain way, when the whole history of the church, and the message of scripture, goes against this idea.

Remember that being single in the ancient world would have been incredibly difficult. It would be assumed that something was wrong with you, and you would be looked upon with pity. Children were seen as a blessing from God, and a guarantee of legacy, and well as a source of income from labor and shrewdly-negotiated marriages. To be single back then would have taken far more courage than is the case now, and yet many in the early church did so, and some in the worldwide church always have.

If the cultural pressure to marry is taken away, or alleviated, some people simply won't pair up and get married. Others might pair up, but never have children. It isn't how they're called to live, in Paul's terms. Others are single because of where they are in their life's journey. I don't get the impression that God has strong feelings either way. Love of self, neighbor and enemy applies no matter what one's relationship status is, and there are a lot of different ways to be a healthy, growing church, with or without married couples. It is good to celebrate a particular kind of relationship, as we do on Valentine's Day, but we should remember to take time to celebrate all kinds of relationships, reflecting what people actually experience over the course of their lives.

Friendship is as Christ-like as marriage can be, and there are many kinds of families, and many kinds of people. We should ensure that all are truly welcome, and all are celebrated.





The MAC Committee would like to thank those who participated in the *Meals for St. Mary's* shelter including our Sunday school children and their families. Through this effort, fourteen members of our community enjoyed delicious meals provided by our congregation.

The MAC Committee would also like to thank those who gave through the *Souper Bowl of Caring* collection, we collected 155 cans and food items and \$120 for the purchase of food to help in our local area.

Missions: Local Focus

The MAC Committee will be collecting food and items for *Phoenixville Area Community Services* (*PACS*) who are dedicated to helping people get through difficult or challenging periods in their lives.

Below are their "HOT ITEMS" that are currently in high demand. Before donating, please check expiration dates and no glass containers or opened products. It is also helpful if you buy a mix (pancake, mac and cheese) to make sure the items needed to make it (milk, eggs, water) are readily available. With the increasing price of milk, eggs, and butter, it is recommended that mixes only need water.

HOT Items:

Cooking oil, juice (shelf-stable), condiments (ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise), coffee, spices (adobo, basil, chili powder, cinnamon, cumin, garlic powder, onion powder, oregano, parsley, red pepper flakes, salt & pepper sets), sugar, shelf-stable non-dairy milk (almond, oat, soy), salad dressing, pancake mix, syrup, flour, bottled water, jelly (grape and strawberry), hot chocolate packets, grits, masa (corn flour), alfredo sauce, baking mixes (brownies, cake) and icing, canned fruit, Chef Boyardee, Crisco, mac and cheese, peanut butter, ramen, snacks (sweet, salty), spaghetti

Non-Food Items that cannot be purchased with SNAP:

Diapers (sizes 5&6), baby wipes, baby body wash, baby food, pull-ups (size 3T-4T, 4T-5T), toilet paper, shampoo and conditioner, deodorant, paper towels, body wash, sanitary pads, shaving cream, tooth brushes, cat food (wet and dry), dog food (wet and dry), kitty litter, laundry detergent (regular and hypoallergenic), bleach/clorox, cleaning spray, dish soap, dishwasher detergent, all purpose cleaner, Clorox wipes, tissues, trash bags

Mission Focus: National Focus

We will again participate in Bread for the World's Offering of Letters in March. Following the worship service on March 26, we encourage you to remain in Fellowship Hall to participate in some letter writing on behalf of poor and hungry people in the U.S. and worldwide. In this month's letter campaign, we will continue to urge our elected representatives to support the 2023 Farm Bill. A significant part of this bill is funding for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program or SNAP (formerly known as Food Stamps). For this reason, the Farm Bill has a real and lasting impact on those in our community who struggle to feed their families. Stay tuned for more information in the March Offering of Letters bulletin.

Mission Focus: Global Missions

The scale of the disaster facing Syria and Turkey after the Feb. 6 earthquake is becoming more apparent. The 7.8-magnitude quake and its aftershocks have left more than 11,000 people dead and thousands more injured; these numbers will rise as search and rescue continue. Buildings have been reduced to rubble, and roads and bridges have been severely damaged, resulting in dangerous conditions for first responders. In some places, such as Aleppo, this destruction is compounding the damage of the 11-year war in Syria.

One of the ways that we can help is through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA). Giving through PDA provides emergency relief and short-term recovery in the impacted areas through long-standing partners in Syria and ACT Alliance members in Syria and Turkey, all of whom are already on the ground. PDA will remain active throughout the recovery process, accompanying our partners in the area as they determine long-term program needs and providing financial support for building resilience.

To assist, please write "Turkey & Syria" in the memo line of a check and drop it off at the church office or through the offering plate during service.

Sunday School

Our Sunday School classes continue to be well-attended and we have been exploring a variety of Biblical topics. Our children are very involved and curious; some inspired discussions can be heard behind the doors of out three Sunday School rooms! We are beginning to collect some of the children's s theologically-oriented questions to pass on to Pastor Doug for inclusion in future sermons.

On March 5, Rebecca Barkley will visit our Sunday School classes to introduce the ukulele and begin teaching some simple songs. She will be bringing her collection of ukuleles (enough for each child to play one). In addition to just making some joyful music in Sunday School, we hope to develop a song or two for performance during worship.



March 5 is also the kick-off day for One Great Hour of Sharing. Children will receive their OGHS fish banks on that day and will be asked to return them – with donations – on Palm Sunday (April 2).

Children will participate in the Palm Sunday worship service, at the beginning (procession in with palms) and at the end (procession out). The choir and congregation will sing the hymn *Filled With Excitement* during both of these times. Children will learn and review the hymn in Sunday School so they can sing along during the processions. On Palm Sunday, children will attend regular Sunday School classes in between these two processions.

A group of parents within our congregation is currently working on a variety of intergenerational events, service projects, and other activities to occur through the spring and summer months. Stay tuned for more information!

As a reminder, Sunday School classes take place every Sunday <u>during</u> the regular worship service, from about 10:45 until 11:45. To assure adequate time for our teachers to complete their lessons, we encourage parents to delay walking upstairs until 11:45, so children don't become distracted at the end of their Sunday School time.
