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From the Pastor

Following up on last month, I am going to be answering two more questions I've received from the kids that are just too complex to answer in a Children's Sermon. Or maybe I just wanted to give long answers to these...

Why did God not give Adam and Eve a second chance in the garden?

When we think of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, as Christians, we probably mostly think about a Fall - about the entry of sin and death into creation, from which Jesus later came to redeem us. I find it interesting that in all of scripture, only Paul mentions this idea, and he only does so a couple of times, and it really took hold of our imagination in Christianity. But for the entirety of the Hebrew Scriptures, what happened in the Garden of Eden is not presented this way. Nor does Jesus bring this up (though he doesn't mention a lot of things, and you can't make a strong argument from absence or silence).

There is a lot of baggage in our reading of Adam and Eve. Reading in English we think Adam was created first, but that isn't true. "*Ha 'adam*" was created first, a word that means something like dust-person or earth-person, and then when *ha adam* is divided into Adam and Eve, Adam gets his name as a play on words with 'dust' or 'earth.' English translations render Eve as Adam's "helper," but almost every other time that Hebrew word appears in scripture it is translated as "savior" and refers to God rescuing the Hebrew people. (And it is never used to refer to someone who is subservient) Does it change your view of the story to see Eve as Adam's "savior?"

In my own reading, the story of the Garden of Eden is a story of inevitability. The creation story places the first humans in a garden, and they are to live in peaceful bliss and tend it forever. So now why is the world the way that it is? Well, here is how Adam and Eve were forced to leave the Garden. Here is why childbirth is painful, and why snakes bite, and why we have to till the soil, etc. Here there is even a clear declaration that Patriarchy is not God's plan, and is in fact a curse! (Genesis 3:16) It is part of an etiological story of how the world came to be, similar to the story of the Tower of Babel explaining why there are many languages instead of just one. But we won't find the physical location of the Garden any more than we will find archaeological ruins of the Tower of Babel. We cannot help but read these stories differently today than when they were first written, 2500 to 3000 years ago (depending on the story). And so Adam and Eve didn't get a second chance in the Garden, perhaps, because that isn't the kind of story it was. If they had gotten a second chance, and everything had turned out well in the Garden, there would have been no one to write a story.

Maybe every time we are placed in a garden and left to live in peace we will mess things up. Maybe human beings struggle to learn from past mistakes (I think we can vouch for that one being true). Maybe Adam and Eve leaving the Garden was the only way for the story to

continue. Maybe it is a metaphor for human intelligence and civilization (human childbirth is so painful because of our large brains, and we till the soil because 10,000 years ago we had agricultural revolutions all over the world). Like any Bible story, there are many ways to read it and find meaning.

There are a lot of other religions, and do they go to heaven or hell, and if so why? (rewritten slightly)

Like many of these questions, this one touches on a literal lifetime of reading and thinking for me, as well as my undergraduate degree and seminary degree and current interfaith work and relationships. So what I'm going to try to do is to give a short answer when I want to write a book.

Different religions ask different questions. Christianity, among the other religions, asks its own questions, and seeks to answer them. But Hinduism, or Sikhism, or Buddhism, etc. ask different questions, and seek to answer those questions. Some questions overlap, and are asked in different ways, like: how should we treat other people? What is a good life? What do we owe society? What happens after we die? Other questions don't overlap at all, but are very important to the religion in question.

Each religion works to answer its own questions first. So a key Buddhis question: "How do we end the eternal karmic cycle of death and rebirth?" is not a question that Christianity even considers. And a key Christian question: "How can we be redeemed from sin?" is similarly not a question that Buddhism spends any time considering. Even the question of heaven and hell differs drastically. Drawing a comparison to (some branches of) Buddhism again (since it's a religion I know a lot about), Buddhism can have many heavens and many hells, but usually all of them are considered false paths, even traps, on the way to enlightenment. If anything, the heaven realms are worse because they are beautiful, pleasant traps, but they prevent enlightenment just as much as the hells. Compare this to the Christian idea of a new heaven and a new earth where the resurrected live forever in a world of joy, peace, and justice. Hopefully you can see the distance between the two views - not two different answers to the same question, but two different questions with two very different answers.

Generally speaking, a religion answers its own questions best. Christianity answers Christian questions better than Buddhis does, and vice-versa. On some issues, like what is a good life, or how we should treat each other, we can have fruitful (and fun!) inter-religious dialogue. We can work together to better our communities and do what's right because we can find wide areas of agreement on what is beneficial. If we are feeding the hungry or making sure people can be educated, we can work with pretty much any religion you can name. Things get a lot more difficult when we start comparing who is going to whose heaven or whose hell. First we have to agree on what heavens and hells we're even talking about.

To be clear I think Christianity has great answers on what is a good life, how we should treat each other, and other questions that religions share, and additionally, I think our specifically Christian questions are important ones. I'm also humble enough, and have learned and studied and experienced enough, to know that my view is largely shaped by where I was born and how I was raised. If I was born in Japan or India, I understand that I would almost certainly have very different religious beliefs. So I love these conversations, and learn a lot through them, but I also approach them with humility and caution.

I think the most fruitful way to live among other religions (which I think is a good thing) is to be eager to work together where we can to make the lives of vulnerable people better, and to respectfully have these larger conversations about big questions when they come up. I don't think it is wrong to believe what we believe, and be clear about what I believe, but at the same time I would expect the same from someone else who practices another religion. In some cases, people will hear something that moves them, and they might convert to a new religion. In other cases, people will hear something meaningful that will deepen their practice of their own religion. To me, both of those are potentially good things, and in the meantime, we can focus on doing good work together.

St. Mary's is hiring! St Mary's Franciscan Shelter for homeless families is seeking a live-in house manager to oversee the shelter's operation Monday – Friday from 9:30 PM – 9:00 AM. Holiday and additional hours might also be available.

The overnight house manager can sleep after closing/securing the shelter (11 PM -6 AM). This shift is considered "on call" should there be an issue overnight. The House Manager is to be available by 6:30 to set up breakfast, oversee the needs of residents, perform light housekeeping, and answer phones until 9 AM.

Job responsibilities include: Closing shelter, setting up breakfast, overseeing the needs of residents, light housekeeping, and answering phones

Compensation includes room, food, laundry facilities, all utilities (including internet and cable) and a bi-weekly stipend of \$500.
